SENTINEL CAMERA PROJECT

Last summer I heard about a camera project involving the City Council called Sentinel Camera Project. Basically, each council district would get 10 cameras a year to put up in one location in their district. The location is determined by crime statistics from the previous year. While our neighbors had done a wonderful job being proactive by purchasing cameras for their homes, and, being vigilant on our Facebook page reporting suspicious activity, I felt like there needed to be more. I contacted Councilman Worth Morgan for more information about this project. Councilman Morgan made me aware that an area in our neighborhood qualified for this project. We ran in to some bumps this spring, but I'm happy to report we are back on track and the cameras are in place! The boundaries for these cameras are: East - Estate / West - Mt Moriah / North - Sea Isle / South - Helene Thank you to Mayor Jim Strickland, Councilman Worth Morgan, Councilman Frank Colvett, Deputy Chief Don Crowe and Colonel Joe Oakley for your support.


friend. Large and small dogs will have their own respective entrances/exits by utilizing the opposing fenced dugouts of the ball diamond! Additionally, Hollywood Feed is planning on holding a minimum of 4 events per year at the Dog Park, further exposing our village to multitudes of pet lovers. I wouldn't be surprised if a canine event might be televised one day from the Dog Park - A canine agility contest or an annual Weiner Dog derby; sounds like a fun day to me!

I actually got the idea for the Dog Park many years ago when I was the owner of a very proud, noble, and fearless Weimaraner named Ceaser. He lived to the very old age of 14.5 years which is crazy old for his breed. We

his breed. We walked the trail at the Park every day and were even at the Park when Hurricane Elvis hit in 2003. We often looked at the baseball dia-

mond and noticed that it was rarely, if not underused. Maybe a dog park could go there one day. Well, that day is now, and it will soon be a reality. Many thanks to John Behnke, who possesses a superlative business acumen and finalized a plan to bring it to fruition, and Molly Laster who exudes a positive influence to make everything a possibility.

They will run and leap over the berms, chase their newfound dog pals and tire themselves so much that they will go home and dream about all the fun they had at the dog park! This is a Dog Park that will be a SIPNA destination and for all Memphians who are at one with their canine family members.



New Park . Entrance or **"The Way In"** In the words of an

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infomercial, "But wait folks there's more!" might

be the new mantra for SIPNA. Plans are underway for yet another new capital improvement to Sea Isle Park. With the anticipated influx of neighbors visiting the new dog park, people will need to park in the parking lot beside Sea Isle Elementary to off load their precious pups. From there, as it stands, to enter the park one walks over a rusty cable limply attached to equally rusty posts, then trods over the "grass" eventually passing by the kiosk to the track. Cable-hop while there's still time because a draft site plan has been put together to build an actual, formal entrance to the park that is wel-

coming to all who visit our park for their leisure. The Parks Commission has given preliminary approval to add a paved walk-

way and landscaping to this area so that it is welcoming to all visitors. Funding will be sourced from your SIPNA treasury - annual dues, the various fundraising events and additional grant money. The Board has solicited assistance from the UT Agricultural Extension who will provide volunteer Master Gardner's to advise us on the landscape design. We anticipate this project to be completed later this summer.

Ridgeway Sensitive Basin

Storm water runoff is familiar to many neighbors in the Sea Isle Park Neighborhood who have struggled to maintain lawns, gardens, homes, and sheds from damage during heavy rains. It's not just a concern for those of us who live here. The City of Memphis is investing hundreds of thousands of dollars in a two year study of the Ridgeway Sensitive Drainage Basin, an area the City has identified as being at high risk for flooding.

Sea Isle Park Neighborhood sits squarely in the basin, roughly bounded by Poplar Avenue/ Poplar Pike Avenue to the north, South White Station Road to the west, I-240/Bill Morris Parkway to the south.

The two year project, contracted to HDR, Inc, and Allworld Project Management, is funded through MLGW storm water fees. Four steps will identify potential solutions for flooding and drainage issues: surveying and mapping, collecting public comments, creating a computer generated model, and analyzing data. Two public meetings were held in April and May to explain the project, but as importantly, to engage public involvement.

Engineers clarified at the last meeting that mapping and modeling is based on the lay of the land as it exists today. In other words, it takes into account the structures that are already in place, not the effect of new builds. As older homes are torn down and lots are subdivided, larger homes are being built closer together and replaced by more, larger homes. These new infill development projects will potentially worsen the storm water runoff issues if the appropriate rain water retention and dispersion concerns are not included in the plans that are being approved by the City of Memphis Office Planning and Development.

The City of Memphis engineers are highly concerned about addressing storm water issues before they become a larger problem. They strongly recommend that citizens report drainage concerns at http:// www.ridgewaybasinstudy.com/communityinput.html. The citizens' input not only helps the engineers maintain failing infrastructure, they will help the study identify areas needing the most attention. 

Since graduating high school and no longer playing sports I have been the type that would tell you, "I'll run when I am chased". So when my wife told me the Sea Isle Neighborhood Association was having a 5K I was noticeably less than enthused. I only agreed to go in order to support our neighbors Keith and Kelly Bowers who on top of being phenomenal people that we have grown very fond of, are also avid runners and founders of the Sea Isle running group.

My children Ava and Mason awoke that Saturday morning as usual, bursting with energy and off the walls to try something new. I squeezed myself into the provided shirt and readied myself for a morning of shooting pains in unexpected places accompanied by gasping and wheezing.

We arrived at McWherter Senior Center to see a substantial crowd enjoying some music, warming up for the run, and generally having a good time. I thought "At least there is some atmosphere to keep the kids entertained." Soon everyone lined up at the starting line and the run was on. I huffed and puffed at a

slow jog and then began to walk the track around the park as my wife and children faded distance. slowly into the

After making my way around the park (No way was I going 5K) I waited for everyone to return expecting my little group to come strolling in together toward the end having had a nice walk. To my surprise I saw my 8-year-old son come running in shortly behind most of the adult group.



I was shocked and proud that he pushed himself harder than I had ever seen to run all 5K in 44 minutes. He came

in fourth in his age group and he was not having that at all! He moped all day and nothing we said could cheer him up, so we called Kelly Bowers to come talk to him. After explaining that he had to train hard if he wanted to win she suggested we bring him to the next run of the Sea Isle running group.

We decided we should all do something to be more active, so we went as a family. After the second run and some great tips and encouragement from the adults he cut 10 minutes off his 5K time. I have never seen him so pleased with himself and the confidence lasted on through the week. The adults are very encouraging and

full of tips for all of us. They give me encouragement as they pass me on the right. We try our best to make the runs every week between sports and school activities. You should come too! 

For millennia, humans have, in some way or another, been marking birds using a form of band around their legs. This reportedly began as a way to send messages over 2000 years ago, and hundreds of years later would be used to mark ownership of individual birds. In the early 1800s. the use of bands to identify individuals was undertaken by the field of ornithology – the scientific study of birds. Using leg bands, John James Audubon discovered that migratory birds would return to where he banded them on their breeding grounds, years after having been marked.

A lot has changed since Audubon banded those birds. However, I regularly enjoy the simple reminders that, the more things change, the more they stay the same. Although the tools we use to conduct scientific research today might differ, the essence remains. Pictured below at

right is a bird many of you have likely seen or heard, especially along the Wolf River Greenway. This is a female prothonotary warbler, a species named for papal clerks of the **Roman Catholic** Church, known as prothonotaries.



unique 9-digit numbers to identify all American citizens. I began studying this species last summer at Shelby Forest, and this is the first bird I caught this spring. She was banded last summer and has returned from her wintering

grounds in southern Mexico/ Guatemala/Yucatan Peninsula to breed in *exactly* the same

nest site she used last year. Dozens more have now followed suit. Each year my students and I use hundreds, soon thousands, of bands to mark these individuals. The abundance of prothonotary warblers has declined significantly over the past 5 decades,

the causes of which are not yet known. With the information we collect on these birds, we can piece together different components of how they live their lives to understand and help conserve the spectacular diversity of life we see on earth and here in West Tennessee.

> Another bird we are studying is the **Carolina** wren (at left), a species with which many of you will be quite familiar. This loquacious bird is found very commonly in our backyards, and will frequently visit feeders, especially in winter (they prefer shelled peanuts!). If you have awoken to a very loud song sounding like "Tea-kettle! Tea-kettle!

Tea-kettle!" then this is likely the culprit. They usually nest in cavities, including nestboxes, and will even build nests in terra cotta pots when turned on edge. You could attract them to your yard with shelled peanuts or peanutbased suet. They are tolerant of human activity, and, although they are wild birds, will occasionally let people pet them. Just be sure to record any band numbers if you see them!

years but only knew about her life through FB posts and pictures. I kept getting these feelings that I needed to interview her but I kept saying, "Why," to myself. That answer will become clear in the last paragraph.

Dana Beech was the daughter of a traveling salesman and lived all over the south until moving to Memphis in 1981. She was in the 11th grade and graduated from Craigmont. She moved to Conway, AR and got her Bachelor's Degree in Psychology and Vocational Re-habilitation. She came back to Memphis in 1997 and went to the University of Memphis and got her Master's Degree in Vocational Rehabilitation. She met Renee Beech that same year and they have been together ever since. She also had a son, Parker, who was in the 3rd grade and they all lived at Hacks Cross and Winchester until moving to Sea Isle Park eleven years ago.

Dana went to work for Youth Villages after getting her Master's Degree. Then, Chase was born in 2001 and, because of his special needs, she stayed home to take care of him. Chase was born with a brain injury at birth and had cerebral

palsy which was mild. Then in 2005, he got sick and went into septic shock from a bacterial infection and got a second brain injury. He was able to walk before that but is now in a wheel-chair. He has a feeding tube that goes straight into his heart, which is their biggest_struggle. With all that entails, she also does volunteer work and is a strong advocate for kids with special needs. With

her educational background and knowing how the system works, she started getting referrals from doctors and meeting parents in therapy that didn't understand when insurance companies say, "no," that doesn't necessarily mean no. She has tons of resources that she's willing to share.

LeBonheur has been their lifeline with all of Chase's needs. They give back to Le-Bonheur every year with donations of super hero capes. "We know how frightening it is for kids and their parents. We want these kids to feel like the heroes they truly are," said Dana, "because we truly understand what they are going through."

"We love our neighborhood and we have tons of support. There are events in the neighborhood that Chase can attend like Cop Stop and SIPFEST. The police will bring the dogs over to Chase and the firemen will lift him up and let him sit in the fire truck. This is huge for us and him." Dana has also gotten motivated, due to Chase getting bigger and she puts herself through a strenuous workout every day and has started eating healthy, so she can continue to be strong and take care of Chase. She even ran the SIPNA 5k and won a prize in her age category. She promptly took her pint glass to Neil's and he filled it up for her.

Recently, through the Tennessee Justice Center, Dana was nominated Mom of the Year.

This is a title she richly deserves. This is an organization based in Nashville, made up of attorneys, who help get people what they need from TennCare or

any insurance issues to help them survive. She also wants parents with special needs children to be aware of the Tennessee Justice Center...it's free and they are a

great resource. Helping people being denied

services they need is Dana's passion.

Now, this is the why I was sent to interview Dana. She started talking about wheelchair accessibility (the lack of) at the play-

ground area of the

park. "There are no wheelchair cuts to get a wheelchair into the playground area." Then, she said, "Our park doesn't have a swing for a wheelchair or a large adult. The one we do have is made for a child that you can pick up and place in the sling or a small adult. They aren't that expensive. We have special needs kids in our neighborhood and it would be wonderful if we could have one."

Ok!!! We have a new project, Folks! We both got excited and decided to make this happen. A double swing, which allows a wheelchair to be rolled into a ramp on one side and a hammock like sling where a child can be placed in the sling or a large handicap person

can sit on the other side, would only cost \$3,000 plus install. It doesn't take up much room and nothing special needs to be placed underneath it. What a better way to make our neighborhood inclusive for everyone. No child should have to sit in a wheelchair and watch other kids swing. Stay tuned for more to come. We are going to talk to the Park Department, legal and look for grants. If you want to get

Keeping Kids Reading During the Summer

Oh summertime! While reading may not be at the top of the to-do list once the final bell rings, the break in the school year offers a great time for kids to read in meaningful ways. Research shows us that summer reading helps prevent "summer slide" so that students can enter the next academic year ready to continue work from the previous spring.

Here are a few tips for keeping your children engaged in summer reading:

1. Recognize that silly books still count! The *Diary of a Wimpy Kid* series is hilarious--and not only will these books make a child laugh out loud, they will also promote a sense of ownership and accomplishment in reading. Reading doesn't have to be serious all the time. Summer is a great time to read some titles that may not be found on lists during the school year.

2. Pick a book in a series! Younger children (elementary) may enjoy the ever-popular *Babymouse* series, the *Hampster Princess* series or the *Secret Coder* series. Older students (middle and high school) might enjoy series books by Rick Riordan or Jenny Han. By finding a book in a series that they enjoy, children are already excited about the next book to read, and they can avoid the dreaded "What do I read now?" dilemma.

3. Read with your child! Seeing adults read shows children that reading happens in real life, not just at school. Model that for them, and they'll be less hesitant to read themselves. Also, reading the same book as your child can be a great way to have a conversation about the book in a way that relates to characters, plot, and empathy. Start by asking some "What would you do?" questions. Generally, the older children get, the less they want to talk to parents. Reading the same book is a great way to start an open, natural conversation. Give teen books a try--you may be surprised at how much you like them!

4. Make a mini-field trip out of it! Perhaps your child is reading a book about a boy who lives in the wilderness, such as *Hatchet*, and you can take the opportunity to go to Shelby Farms and learn a bit about the land. *The One and Only Ivan* could warrant a trip to the zoo to see if the animals really embody the characters in the plot (How do the gorillas at the zoo compare to those in the book?). Rewarding reading with small trips related to the book can be fun for the whole family. By showing children that reading connects to everyday life, reading becomes more meaningful for them.

There are tons of great books out there!

> somehow build a running hill, as in a 90" tall berm? Anything is possible I say! I love bucket lists!


