Sea Isle booklet excerpt by Pat Merrill, SIPNA President, 1986.

"The Sea Isle Park Neighborhood is alive and well because people cared. Buoyed up by successes and undaunted by disappointments, they joined together to form a more perfect neighborhood.

The Sea Isle Park Neighborhood Association grew out of a meeting called at the home of Mary Rose McCormick to mobilize a protest against rezoning on Park Avenue. At the meeting, the neighbors decided it was time to shed the "negative neighbor" image unfairly earned through reaction to repeated attacks by developers on the integrity of the neighborhood. It was time to take the initiative to be a positive force in the planned development of the community.


A Steering Committee was chosen to guide the birth of the Association. Attorney Jim Lawrence drafted the by-laws and filed for non-profit corporation status. The Charter was granted in September 1979. Pat Merrill was listed as agent.

The boundaries chosen for the Association

followed geopolitical lines. The Southern Railroad on the north, I-240 on the east and south and Mt.Moriah, a major road on the west were also the boundaries of Ward 67 and Census Tract 95.

The name, Sea Isle Park Neighborhood Association, was chosen because the Sea Isle School and Park property lies in the geographic center, the heart of the 3,000 plus family residential neighborhood and is the focus of neighborhood activity."





# SAND ONES CENTESIPNA!

I've seen her post on the Sea Isle Facebook page about her

company and had a vague idea of what she did but after this interview, y'all need to know about Cristina McCarter and City Tasting Tours.

Cristina is a home grown Memphian, raised in north Memphis. In adulthood she moved to Midtown where she met her husband. After her son was born and rent went sky high around Overton Square, they started looking around. All she knew about Sea Isle was Memphis Pizza

Cafe and Gibson's Donuts. They looked at three houses and settled on the one with a huge backyard... can't get those big backyards in midtown. "Our neighbors came over and introduced themselves and brought their dog over. It was such a smooth transition to move here and I'm close to Sprouts," said Cristina.

Whenever Cristina traveled, she would always do a food tour to learn about other cities. She has worked for Yelp and Memphis Flyer and always with something related to food. Then, she started a food blog talking about places she wanted to try or giving reviews on places where she had eaten. She thought about doing food tours in Memphis when she was 21 but there weren't enough restaurants downtown to justify tours.

After her son was born, she took a break from work and in 2016, she decided to make the food tour happen. She got her website up and tours were booked. She had plans to make it a real touristy tour and tell people about Memphis' history, take them to Beale Street, and promote Memphis. To her surprise, the majority of people booking the tours are Memphians. She sticks with downtown because it's walkable. "I find restaurants that are new or the ones that are so good that people need to try," she said.

and will accommodate as few as two or as many as 35 people. Crosstown Concourse has now been added to the tasting tour. Once you book your tour, all you have to do is show up hungry. This is a great gift for the foodie in your life, a birthday party, anniversary celebration, or a different way to see Memphis and have good food.

When I moved to SIPNA 3 vears ago, I was most excited to have a yard to garden in. I imagine I'm not alone in the excitement spring and summer bring when both flowers and vegetable gardens begin growing.

The "garden-to-table" concept has become a popular one, even in urban areas. Participating in the growing of our food is so exciting! Did you know, if properly composted, your food can become dirt again to go back in the garden?

Even when we're trying to waste less, it's inevitable there will be food thrown away. When not composted, food waste creates environmental issues like toxic leachate and methane. A solution for this problem is beginning a compost pile, but for those of us who work full time, the maintenance of such a pile is overwhelming.


The solution? Meet the Compost Fairy. They are Memphis' only curbside compost collection service. I signed up as a subscriber to have my compost picked up each week and, as a bonus, I receive finished compost to put into my garden in the spring and fall. Gardento-table, table-to-garden, a beautiful cycle! Compost Fairy's executive director Mike Larrivee told me, "We're on track to divert 80,000 tons of compostables from the landfill by 2020. That's the equivalent of 36,000 cars being taken off the road, 16,000 acres of cropland being restored, and 150,000 tons of carbon being removed from the atmosphere each year."

Don't throw that kitchen waste in the trash, have Compost Fairy drop off a bucket for you to begin composting! You can find information about their services and what they compost on their website **compostfairy.com**

The East Memphis Food Pantry will open its doors in June with its first monthly distribution day. In the greater Memphis area, there are more than 110,000 children who are food insecure. 
